PARTIES

4. The COMPANY is a corporation duly organized and existing under the laws of the State of California, having its principal place of business in St. Helena, California.

5. COGNETTI, an individual, is upon information and belief a resident of Sonoma County.

6. BRINDARE is a California limited liability company formed on or about May 23, 2024. Upon information and belief, its principal place of business is in this county.

7. The true names and capacities of the Defendants named herein as DOES 1 through 50, inclusive, whether individual, corporate, associate or otherwise, are unknown to PLAINTIFF who therefore sue such Defendants by fictitious names. PLAINTIFF is informed and believes that DOES 1 through 50 are California residents, or individuals over whom this Court nevertheless has jurisdiction. PLAINTIFF will amend its claim to show such true names and capacities when they are ascertained. Based on information and belief, PLAINTIFF alleges that Defendants sued as DOES 1 through 50, and each of them, are liable in whole or in part for the wrongful acts alleged herein.

8. At all relevant times, each Defendant was and is the agent of each of the remaining Defendants, and in doing the acts alleged herein, was acting within the course and scope of such agency. Each Defendant ratified and/or authorized the wrongful acts of each of the Defendants.

9. In committing the wrongful acts alleged herein, Defendants have pursued, or joined in the pursuit of, a common course of conduct, and have acted in concert with and conspired with one another in furtherance of the improper acts and transactions that are the subject of this claim.

10. Each Defendant aided and abetted and rendered substantial assistance in the wrongs complained of herein. In taking such actions to substantially assist the commission of the wrongdoing complained of herein, each Defendant acted with knowledge of the primary wrongdoing, substantially assisted in the accomplishment of that wrongdoing, and was aware of his, her, or its overall contribution to and furtherance of the wrongdoing.

11. COGNETTI and BRINDARE, along with DOES 1-50 are collectively referred to herein as "DEFENDANTS."

2 24. UPSON, through the William F. Upson Trust, has at all relevant times, owned 51%
3 of the common stock of the COMPANY and COGNETTI has at all relevant times, owned 49%.¹

4 25. Pursuant to a written agreement, UPSON had the authority to manage the business
5 and affairs of the COMPANY subject to majority board approval for certain major decisions.

6 26. No shareholder is entitled to receive any salary or other compensation from the
7 COMPANY unless authorized by unanimous vote of the shareholders.

8 27. Upon information and belief, COGNETTI secretly instructed the head of Human
9 Resources ("HR") to issue payments to him via payroll and outside of the normal and approved
10 COMPANY distributions.

11 28. The shareholders also are prohibited from engaging in any outside employment that
12 materially interferes with the business of the corporation or which conflicts with the shareholder's
13 obligations to the corporation.

14 29. On or about August 15, 2015, the COMPANY entered into a ten-year lease with the
15 LANDLORD to lease 641 Main Street, St. Helena, for purposes of operating the COMPANY's
16 catering and events business.

17 30. The leased property included breathtaking event space and approximately 3,000
18 square feet of outdoor patio space and an adjoining event garden, in the heart of Napa Valley. It is
19 described as being "nestled in heart of Napa Valley," a premiere destination for weddings and
20 events.

21 31. UPSON was instrumental in securing the valuable lease in 2015. Among other
22 things, UPSON negotiated with the LANDLORD to secure the space and directed clients of his
23 separate business, Tra Vigne Restaurant, to *Tre Posti* to support the fledgling catering and event
24 COMPANY during its first year in business.²

25 32. The lease was particularly valuable because it came with existing furniture, fixtures

27 ¹ UPSON owns 5,100 shares and COGNETTI owns 4,900 shares.

28 ² In 2008, UPSON allowed COGNETTI to become a 5% owner of True Alliance, Inc., which owns
Tra Vigne Restaurant. COGNETTI was allowed to acquire another 2.79% in 2018.

1 and equipment needed to operate a catering and events business.

2 33. In addition, the COMPANY secured rights to use a valuable liquor license from
3 LANDLORD's affiliated entity, 641 Main Street, LLC.

4 34. Since its formation in 2015, the COMPANY has expended significant time and
5 resources building the goodwill of *Tre Posti*.

6 35. It also has developed customer and vendor lists, negotiated pricing and contracts.
7 and recruited talented event and catering staff, all required to run a first-class, profit-making
8 venture.

9 36. At all times, UPSON provided valuable back-office support for administrative, HR,
10 legal, and operational needs of the catering and events business, through HUP Incorporated
11 ("HUP"). HUP has provided recruiting referral services, training programs, employee handbooks
12 and manuals, which were proprietary to HUP and which enabled *Tre Posti* to hire and retain some
13 of Napa Valley's most talented event and catering staff.

14 37. As of 2024, the COMPANY employed roughly 130 full-and part-time employees.

15 38. HUP has diligently maintained payroll, accounting, human resource, and legal
16 functions for *Tre Posti*.

17 39. As of 2024, the COMPANY generated approximately \$1 million a year in
18 distributable profits to UPSON and COGNETTI, which they split 51/49.

19 40. Recognizing *Tre Posti's* popularity and success, and the contributions of both
20 UPSON and COGNETTI, on or about February 5, 2024, the LANDLORD presented UPSON and
21 COGNETTI with a written ten-year lease extension, a true and correct copy of which is attached
22 hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated herein by reference.

23 41. UPSON, acting as President, executed the amendment.

24 42. COGNETTI declined to execute the amendment, saying he "needed to think about
25 it."

26 43. The following week, COGNETTI told UPSON he had decided he wanted "do his
27 own thing."

28 44. Thereafter, UPSON located a new, talented chef to replace COGNETTI.

1 45. Continuing with the pretense that he intended to leave *Tre Posti*, COGNETTI gave
2 the new prospective chef a tour of the event and catering space.

3 46. On or about May 16, 2024, the LANDLORD agreed to extend the lease term from
4 August 5, 2025 to December 31, 2025. A true and correct copy of the extension is attached hereto
5 as **Exhibit B** and incorporated herein by reference.

6 47. UPSON signed the extension.

7 48. COGNETTI refused to sign the extension.

8 49. In August 2024, when UPSON was undergoing medical treatment, COGNETTI
9 presented UPSON with a proposed term sheet for a buy out of his stock in the COMPANY.

10 50. COGNETTI proposed a “book value” instead of “Fair Value,” which substantially
11 undervalued UPSON’s stock.³

12 51. UPSON rejected the proposed buyout as unreasonably low and unacceptable.

13 52. Having failed in his attempt to low ball UPSON, COGNETTI apparently set his
14 sights on stealing the valuable catering and events business instead.

15 53. Upon information and belief, in breach of his fiduciary obligations as a director,
16 officer, and shareholder in a close corporation, and in violation of his duty of loyalty, COGNETTI
17 met in secret with the LANDLORD and negotiated a deal whereby the LANDLORD would rent
18 the property to his entity, BRINDARE, commencing August 6, 2025.

19 54. COGNETTI also, upon information and belief, made a deal with the LANDLORD
20 to transfer the liquor license to BRINDARE as well.

21 55. COGNETTI did the above without informing the COMPANY or obtaining its prior
22 consent.

23 56. Later, the LANDLORD—upon information and belief at COGNETTI’s urging—
24 tried to pressure the COMPANY into selling the *Tre Posti* name, which it refused.

25 57. Unable to steal this last asset, COGNETTI rebranded under the name
26 “BRINDARE,” which means “to toast” in Italian.

27
28 ³ Section 3.3.2 of the shareholder’s agreement between the parties contains a formula to employ
“Fair Value,” assuming a ten-year remainder on the lease.

1 58. Upon information and belief, COGNETTI offered the LANDLORD additional
2 remuneration or incentive to deny the COMPANY the lease extension and thereafter the
3 LANDLORD refused to deal with the COMPANY, presenting COGNETTI's usurpation as a *fait*
4 *accompli*.

5 59. The LANDLORD later demanded that the COMPANY release its rights to the
6 valuable liquor license (#562149), which upon information and belief has been transferred to
7 BRINDARE as the new operator, effective August 6, 2025.

8 60. In addition, in or around May 2025, COGNETTI instructed the COMPANY's
9 Director of HR to issue WARN notices on behalf of the COMPANY giving notice of the intent to
10 terminate all 130 full-and part-time employees, with termination effective August 5, 2025, the date
11 the COMPANY's lease is to expire now that the extension had been withdrawn.

12 61. Upon information and belief, BRINDARE plans to rehire all – or most – of the
13 employees hired and trained by the COMPANY.

14 62. The employees are a vital asset of the COMPANY and along with the loss of the
15 lease and liquor license, have made it impossible for the COMPANY to operate or generate any
16 profit after August 5.

17 63. In short, COGNETTI has made the COMPANY, and its stock, worthless, and has
18 transferred all of its value to himself. through BRINDARE.

19 64. Worse, and making no pretext of loyalty, COGNETTI launched his competing
20 website while a director and officer.

21 65. The competitive website (<https://brindarenapa.com/>) brazenly copies many features
22 of the *Tre Posti* website (<https://treposti.com/>).⁴

23 66. While discovery has not yet taken place, the COMPANY is informed and believes
24 that COGNETTI and BRINDARE booked events that should have been booked by the COMPANY
25 and retained revenue even for periods before lease termination. Attached hereto as **Exhibit C** are
26

27 ⁴ Copying *Tre Posti*, BRINDARE advertises on its website that it is "Nestled in the heart of the
28 Napa Valley," that it "offers four distinct venues" (substituting the word distinct for unique), and
specializes in "seamless event coordination" (replacing *Tre Posti's* assurance that "event is
seamless.") It even uses some of *Tre Posti's* iconic photos.

1 true and correct website printouts which purport to show events booked while the COMPANY is
2 still doing business in the location.

3 **FIRST CAUSE OF ACTION**
4 **BREACH OF FIDUCIARY DUTY**
5 **(Against All DEFENDANTS)**

6 67. PLAINTIFF hereby incorporates by reference each of the paragraphs set forth
7 above.

8 68. By reason of being a director and officer of the COMPANY, as well as a shareholder
9 in a close corporation, COGNETTI owed fiduciary duties of the highest good faith, undivided
10 loyalty, reasonable care, integrity, and fair dealing to PLAINTIFF.

11 69. The corporate opportunity doctrine prohibits corporate fiduciaries, such as directors,
12 officers, and in some cases shareholders. from acquiring opportunities that belong to the
13 corporation. This includes opportunities in which the corporation has an interest, a tangible
14 expectancy, or that are essential to its existence. The doctrine is rooted in the fiduciary duty of
15 loyalty, which requires fiduciaries to act in the best interests of the corporation and not to compete
16 with it to its detriment.

17 70. COGNETTI did the acts alleged herein to gain an advantage over PLAINTIFF and
18 to benefit himself to the detriment of PLAINTIFF by usurping a business opportunity, both the
19 long-term lease and the liquor license, thereby breaching his fiduciary duties to PLAINTIFF.⁵

20 71. At all times, the COMPANY had the financial ability to enter into the lease, the
21 lease served a vital part of the COMPANY's business, and the LANDLORD had offered to extend
22 the lease until 2035.

23 72. Upon information and belief, COGNETTI also converted for his own use valuable
24 confidential and other assets of the COMPANY including an unpublished list of desirable
25 employees, together with an itemization of their salaries,⁶ nonpublic vendor lists (and contract and

26 ⁵ Indisputably, the COMPANY had an expectancy in the extension of its lease and liquor license
27 which were offered by the LANDLORD. Further, the catering and events business, at the same
28 location, is indisputably, the COMPANY's "line of business" and is "essential to its existence."

1 supply terms), customer lists, relative value of customers. and other methods and techniques of
2 doing business, which enabled DEFENDANTS to gain an unfair competitive advantage in not
3 having to expend resources developing those assets for themselves.

4 73. BRINDARE rendered substantial assistance to, encouraged and/or aided and abetted
5 COGNETTI's breach of fiduciary duty, including among other things, upon information and belief
6 executing a lease with LANDLORD, obtaining the liquor license, setting up a competing website,
7 booking events belonging to the COMPANY, and using the COMPANY's valuable nonpublic
8 information to set up its own competing business in the ruins of the COMPANY's once profitable
9 venture.

10 74. As a result of the conduct of the DEFENDANTS, and each of them. PLAINTIFF
11 has suffered substantial economic loss and other damages all in an amount to be determined
12 according to proof at the time of trial, including lost profits from the catering and events business.
13 It is estimated that at least \$1 million in profits per year are being or will be diverted from
14 PLAINTIFF through the expiration of the new lease term in 2035.

15 75. In addition, COGNETTI paid himself undisclosed profits of the COMPANY
16 disguised as wages, without the COMPANY's consent. Upon information and belief, he also
17 diverted business –including events – from the COMPANY. Therefor an accounting is required.

18 76. The aforementioned acts of said DEFENDANTS, and each of them, were done
19 maliciously, oppressively, and fraudulently, and PLAINTIFF is entitled to punitive and exemplary
20 damages in an amount to be shown according to proof at trial.

21 77. PLAINTIFF seeks a disgorgement of profits or the imposition of a constructive trust
22 over the misappropriated opportunities and property of the COMPANY.

23 78. In relation to the imposition of a constructive trust, PLAINTIFF hereby requests an
24 order that directs DEFENDANTS to convey the property to the COMPANY at their cost, and to
25 account to the COMPANY for net rents, issues or profits obtained from the property while they
26 held it. This includes but is not limited to all profits from "BRINDARE" or any other brand used
27 by DEFENDANTS to run the catering and events business.

28 WHEREFORE, PLAINTIFF prays for relief as set forth below.

SECOND CAUSE OF ACTION
INTENTIONAL INTERFERENCE WITH PROSPECTIVE ECONOMIC ADVANTAGE
(Against All DEFENDANTS)

79. PLAINTIFF hereby incorporates by reference each of the paragraphs set forth above as though fully set forth hereinafter.

80. At all relevant times, PLAINTIFF enjoyed an economic relationship with the LANDLORD which rented the premises at 641 Main Street to PLAINTIFF under a long-term lease, which it offered to extend until 2035.

81. PLAINTIFF also enjoyed an economic interest in the liquor license.

82. DEFENDANTS knew of the existence of these contracts and relationships, and knew of the proposed written lease amendment, and intentionally engaged in the wrongful conduct described above, including obtaining confidential information of PLAINTIFF concerning the proposed lease extension and using those terms to, upon information and belief, outbid PLAINTIFF for the space.

83. In addition, at all relevant times, COGNETTI owed fiduciary duties to the COMPANY; his interference with the COMPANY's existing and prospective contract and opportunities was itself wrongful, as was BRINDARE's aiding and abetting such breach of fiduciary duty. COGNETTI had no right to take a corporate opportunity and his doing so violated his fiduciary and contractual duties to the COMPANY.

84. Additionally, upon information and belief, COGNETTI is an officer and director of BRINDARE, and in that capacity, he personally directed or participated in the tortious conduct by BRINDARE.

85. DEFENDANTS knew that the interference was certain or substantially certain to occur as a result of their actions.

86. As a result of DEFENDANTS' conduct, the contracts and relationships were actually disrupted as LANDLORD did not extend the lease or the liquor license and instead offered them to DEFENDANTS.

87. As a proximate result of DEFENDANTS' conduct, PLAINTIFF suffered substantial economic loss in an amount to be determined according to proof at the time of trial, including lost

1 profits from the St. Helena catering and events business. It is estimated that at least \$1 million in
2 profits per year are being or will be diverted from PLAINTIFF.

3 88. The aforementioned acts of said DEFENDANTS, and each of them, were done
4 maliciously, oppressively, and fraudulently, and PLAINTIFF is entitled to punitive and exemplary
5 damages in an amount to be shown according to proof at trial.

6 WHEREFORE, PLAINTIFF prays for relief as set forth below.

7 **THIRD CAUSE OF ACTION**
8 **NEGLIGENT INTERFERENCE WITH PROSPECTIVE ECONOMIC ADVANTAGE**
9 **(Against All DEFENDANTS)**

10 89. PLAINTIFF hereby incorporates by reference each of the paragraphs set forth above
11 as though fully set forth hereinafter.

12 90. At all relevant times, PLAINTIFF enjoyed a lease and the right to extend the lease
13 with the LANDLORD, as well as a right to use the liquor license of 641 Main Street.

14 91. DEFENDANTS, who owed a duty to the COMPANY, knew of the existence of
15 these contracts and relationships and negligently engaged in the wrongful conduct described above.

16 92. As a result, these relationships were actually disrupted as PLAINTIFF was denied
17 the opportunity to extend its long-term lease and liquor license for another 10 years.

18 93. As a proximate result of these DEFENDANTS' conduct, PLAINTIFF suffered
19 substantial damages.

20 WHEREFORE, PLAINTIFF prays for relief as set forth below.

21 **FOURTH CAUSE OF ACTION**
22 **BREACH OF SHAREHOLDERS AGREEMENT**
23 **(Against COGNETTI)**

24 94. PLAINTIFF hereby incorporates by reference each of the paragraphs set forth above
25 as though fully set forth hereinafter.

26 95. COGNETTI entered into a written Shareholder Agreement with the COMPANY on
27 or about August 11, 2015 (the "Agreement").

28 96. Pursuant to the Agreement, COGNETTI was required to contribute his efforts to
make the COMPANY a "first-class profit-making venture." He was not allowed to engage in any
business that materially interfered with the business of the COMPANY.

97. While the shareholders, including COGNETTI, were entitled to distributions from time to time, no shareholder was permitted to receive any salary or other compensation from the COMPANY unless authorized by the unanimous vote of the shareholders.

98. In taking the actions described above, COGNETTI breached the Agreement.

99. As a proximate result of these breaches, PLAINTIFF suffered damages.

WHEREFORE, PLAINTIFF prays for relief as set forth below.

PRAYER FOR RELIEF

WHEREFORE, PLAINTIFF prays for judgment against DEFENDANTS, and each of them, as follows:

1. Compensatory and special damages according to proof;
2. An accounting;
3. Disgorgement of all ill-gotten profits;
4. A constructive trust over the property of the COMPANY;
5. Punitive and exemplary damages according to proof;
6. Attorneys' fees to the extent allowed by law;
7. Costs of the proceedings herein;
8. All such other and further relief as the Court deems just and proper.

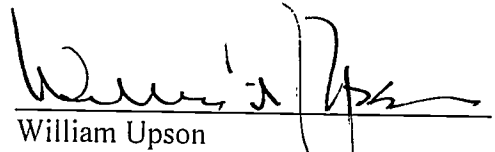

AMENDMENT TO 641 MAIN STREET RESTAURANT LEASE

THIS AMENDMENT is made and entered into as of February 5, 2024 by and between VINELAND STATION, L.P., a California limited partnership ("Landlord"), and SAPANGO, INC., a California corporation ("Tenant").

Landlord and Tenant are the parties to that certain 641 Main Street Restaurant Lease dated August 5, 2015 with respect to certain premises, a portion of which is commonly identified as 641 Main Street, St. Helena, CA (the "Lease"). Landlord and Tenant desire to amend the Lease to, among other changes, extend the date of Term Expiration, give Landlord rights to terminate the Lease under certain conditions and to clarify the status of the liquor license used in connection with the business operated on the Premises and they, therefore, do hereby agree as follows:

- ✓ 1. Extension of the Term. The date of Term Expiration, as set forth in the Basic Lease Information, is hereby amended to be December 31, 2035. ✓
2. Landlord's Option to Terminate. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in the Lease, Landlord may terminate the Lease upon at least one (1) year's prior notice to Tenant if William Frederick Upson and/or Anthony Nash Cognetti cease to be the chief executive officer and chief financial officer or to control the significant business decisions of Tenant. Upon the date of such termination, Tenant shall deliver possession of the Premises to Landlord in the condition required under the Lease.
3. Liquor License. Tenant is the co-licensee with 641 Main Street, LLC, a California limited liability company, an entity which is wholly-owned by Landlord under the liquor license (#562149) which is used for the restaurant business operated on the Premises. Upon the expiration or earlier termination of the Lease, promptly following Landlord's request and at Tenant's expense, Tenant shall execute and deliver such documents and take such other actions as may reasonably be requested by Landlord to terminate Tenant's rights under the liquor license and to transfer ownership and more fully vest ownership of the liquor license in 641 Main Street, LLC or its designee.
4. Amendment of Exhibit A. Exhibit A to the Lease is hereby deleted and Exhibit A to this Amendment is hereby substituted therefor.
5. Ratification. Landlord and Tenant hereby ratify and confirm the terms of the Lease as amended in paragraphs 1 – 4 above.
6. Counterparts. This Amendment may be executed in counterparts and all of such counterparts, taken together, shall constitute one and the same instrument.
